

Week 3: The Character of God

- He engaged with God.
- He knew the standards of righteousness.
- He persevered.

He kept his faith in a powerful God.

"I know that my Redeemer lives, and that in the end He will stand on the earth. And after my skin has been destroyed, yet in my flesh I will see God; I myself will see Him with my own eyes—I, and not another, How my heart yearns within me!" Job 18:25-27

He did not curse God, despite his wife urging him to do so.

"So Satan went out from the presence of the Lord and afflicted Job with painful sores from the soles of his feet to the crown of his head. Then Job took a piece of broken pottery and scraped himself with it as he sat among the ashes. His wife said to him 'Are you still maintaining your integrity? Curse God and die!' He replied, 'You are talking like a foolish woman. Shall we accept good from God, and not trouble?' "

Job 2:7-10

Compare to Sufferers in the Tribulation

"People gnawed their tongues in agony and cursed God in heaven because of their pains and their sores, but they refused to repent of what they had done."

Revelation 16: 11-12

Job also suffered skin sores, but he repented and refused to curse God.

Job finally became quiet before God.

"In repentance and rest is your salvation, in quietness and trust is your strength...."








The Lord broke through Job's blinders.

He used nature—the handiwork of God as Creator—to show Job, in full splendor, his position: that he was a created being and not equal to God.

- Job repented.
- Job realized he was unworthy.

Job forgave and was forgiven – and forgiveness <u>frees us.</u>

"And the Lord turned the captivity of Job, when he prayed for his friends " Job 42:10 (KJV)

Most of all,
Job found relationship
with God.

Then Job replied to the Lord:

".... my ears had heard of you

but now my eyes have seen you.

Therefore, I despise myself and repent in dust and ashes."

Job 42:1-6

Throughout history, holy men of God were those in relationship with God.



God wants Relationship

Relationship

"They will be my people, and I will be their God, for they return to me with all their heart."

Jeremiah 22:16

Job could not enter into relationship with God until he saw himself for who he was.

Pride blocks relationship with God.

The Lord's Words

"I hate pride and arrogance, evil behavior and perverse speech."

Proverbs 8:13

In his brokenness, Job came to understand God's purposes in allowing him to suffer: to bring him into relationship with God. And relationship is being in commune with the Holy Spirit.

God is logical.

He acts with profound and florious purpose. "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him, who have been called according to His purpose."

Romans 8:28

Then Job replied to the Lord:

"I know that you can do all things; <u>no purpose of yours can be thwarted.</u> You asked 'Who is this that obscures <u>my plans</u> without knowledge?' Surely I spoke of things I did not understand, things too wonderful for me to know . . ."

It was **God's purpose** that the three friends missed.

Immediately after Job's confession, the Lord said to Eliphaz the Temanite, "I am angry with you and your two friends, because you have not spoken the truth about me, as my servant Job has"

Elihu was **exempted** from the rebuke.

Of Job's four friends, only Elihu spoke of the concept of providence and, in doing so, escaped God's rebuke. "I will ascribe justice to my Maker [God] is mighty, and firm in his purpose," said Elihu. Job 36:3-5

"Be on guard! Turn back from evil, for God sent this suffering to keep you from a life of evil."

Elihu, explaining to Job the purpose of his suffering Job 36:21 (NLT)

God is forgiving.

"If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land."

2 Chronicles 7:14

God is patient.

"The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. Instead, he is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance."

I Peter 3:9

"The Lord is slow to anger but great in power..."

Nahum 1:3



Job reconciled with family and friends.









He lived another 140 years.

Under the re-interpretation, Job's story is consistent with the rest of Scriptures. Job is no longer a "hermit" book with independent and unfamiliar themes.

Of critical importance is the character of God.

The traditional interpretation of Job's journey elevates man, which unintentionally denigrates God and discredits his justice.

The Lord to Job

"Would you discredit my justice? Would you condemn me to justify yourself?"

Job 40:8

Traditional Interpretation

When we believe man is good, we try to enter the gates or righteousness through the Law, the achievement of which relies on our own strength.

It has a form of godliness, but denies its power.

2 Timothy 3:5

Theme: Law

Traditional Interpretation

Man can achieve righteousness through outward acts and ceremony.

(THE LAW)

Unspoken Implications

Man becomes proud and self-righteous. Religious pride is the root of so many misdeeds by religious people.



Re-Interpretation

Man can achieve righteousness only through <u>repentance</u> and faith. In many of today's congregations, faith without repentance for sin is accepted.

Traditional Interpretation

When we believe man is good, we cannot comprehend the holiness of God and we cannot experience the magnificence and true joy of his forgiveness.

God is holy.

Theme: God is Holy

"Holy, holy is the Lord Almighty; the whole earth is full of his glory." Isaiah 6:3

"Dominion <u>and awe</u> belong to the Lord"

Bildad in Job 25:2

Under the traditional interpretation, some authors praise Job's honesty for venting his anger against God. They even give his wife a pass for urging him to curse to God.



Unspoken Implications

We have the right to "let it all hang out" and lash out against God.

Traditional Interpretation

Such behavior portrays an ignorance of God's holiness. It elevates human comfort above God's purposes.

Re-Interpretation

The only appropriate approach to the Lord is extreme reverence. He welcomes our questions and expression of emotions, but in deference to his holy authority.

Andrew Murray said the closer we draw to the light, the more visible become the impurities in our souls.

"Woe to me!" I cried. "I am ruined! For I am a man of unclean lips and my eyes have seen the King, the Lord Almighty."

Isaiah 6:5

"But one who is more powerful than I will come, the straps of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie . . . "

Luke 3:16

Only in the power of the Spirit can we begin to know the magnificence of God.


Works of the Spirit

"Test me in this," says the Lord Almighty, "and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that there will not be room to store it."

(Which is what he did with Job)

Malachi 3:10

But He will bless us only on His terms.

"See, I am setting before you a blessing and a curse—the blessing if you obey the commands of the Lord your God that I am giving you today."

Deuteronomy 11:26-27

God curses, too


"See, I am setting before you a blessing and a curse—the . . . curse if you disobey the commands of the Lord your God . . . "

An Old Testament Curse

"... I will be quick to testify against sorcerers, adulterers and perjurers, against those who defraud laborers of their wages, who oppress the widows and the fatherless, who deprive the foreigners among you of justice, but do not fear me," says the Lord Almighty.

A New Testament Curse



Matthew 23:25

God's wrath is intended to bring us into relationship with Him.

"Surely it was for my benefit that I suffered such anguish. In Your love You kept me from the pit of destruction; You have put all my sins behind Your back."

Isaiah 38:17

God uses suffering to refine us.

"For he will be like a refiner's fire . . . He will purify the Levites and refine them like gold and silver. Then the Lord will have men who will bring offerings in righteousness..."

Malachi 3:2-3

"In all of this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while you may have had to suffer grief in all kinds of trials. These have come so that the proven genuineness of your faith—of greater worth then gold, which perishes even though refined by fire—may result in praise, glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed. Though you have not seen Him, you love Him, and even though you do not see Him now, you believe in Him and are filled with an inexpressible and glorious joy, for you are receiving the end result of your faith, the salvation of your souls."

God is sbrewd.

More than four dozen times, the Lord uses "off-the-nose" language at the end of the book of Job.

"Where were you when I laid the earth's foundation? Surely you know!" Job 38:4-5

"What is the way to the abode of light? And where does darkness reside? Surely you know, for you were already born! You have lived so many years!"

Job 38:19-21

It makes sense that the Lord used the same literary device in the beginning.

"Have you considered my servant Job?" the Lord shrewdly asks Satan. 'There is no one on the earth like him, he is blameless and upright, a man who fears God and shuns evil." Job 1:8.

"To the faithful, you show yourself faithful, to the blameless, you show yourself blameless, to the pure, you show yourself pure, but to the devious, you show yourself shrewd."

Old Interpretation



Job Chapters 3-42 shape the Re-Interpretation **Re-interpretation** Job Chapters 1 & 2

The theory of the shrewdness of God reconciles the two. God turned Job over to Satan to deliver him from his fleshly nature.

Shrewdness of God

"So when you are assembled and I am with you in spirit, and the power of the Lord Jesus is present, hand this man over to Satan for the destruction of the flesh, so that his spirit may be saved on the day of the Lord."

I Corinthians 5:4-5

Shrewdness of God

"Among them are Hymenaeus and Alexander, whom I have handed over to Satan to be taught not to blaspheme."

I Timothy 1:20

God uses Satan against himself. Satan would have been better off had he left Job alone, thus permitting one more religious man without a relationship with God to roam the earth.

Imagine the impact Job made for God in his last 140 years, living in joyful union with God.

Imagine the impact on Friends. Family. Servants. The Noble men. And the boys among the rocks.

And the boys among the rocks!
